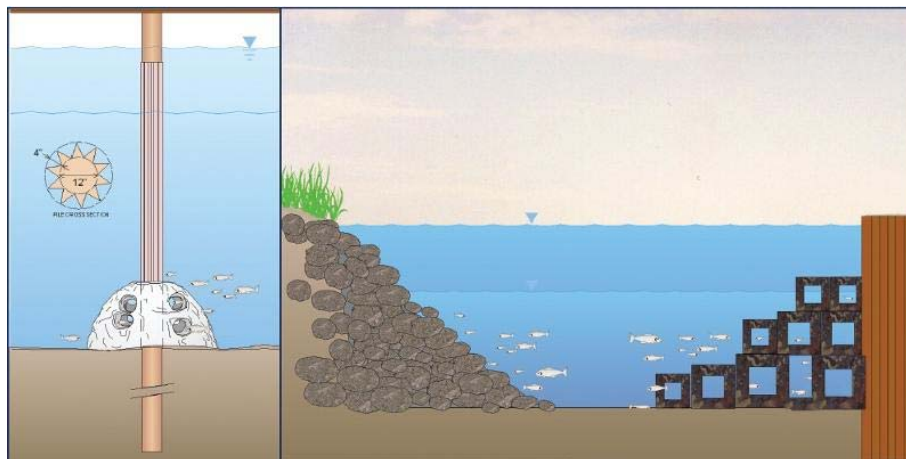

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Urban shorelines request for proposals - deadline closing September 12, intent to apply (suggested) due August 28!

A reminder that the NY-NJ Harbor & Estuary Program in partnership with New England Interstate Water Pollution Control Commission is accepting proposals to develop and pilot ***a standard protocol to assess the habitat quality associated with ecologically enhanced shoreline stabilization techniques*** in the NY-NJ Harbor Estuary.

The deadline for a **statement of intent** to apply is **August 28** (optional, but recommended) and the **deadline for applications is September 12, 2013**. The New York-New Jersey Harbor & Estuary Program (HEP), in partnership with the New England Interstate Water Pollution Control Commission (NEIWPCC), is now accepting applications from environmental and/or community organizations to **monitor for pathogen indicators and other water quality parameters** in tributaries to the NY-NJ Harbor Estuary. Funding available for community-based marine debris removal through NOAA - deadline November 1

For those looking to fund removal of debris that is currently impacting habitat quality, there is a new opportunity for funding from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. Awards generally include on the ground habitat restoration components involving the removal of marine debris, including derelict fishing gear.
